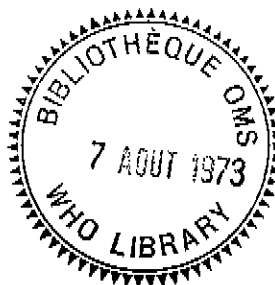

4. Additionally, it notes that clear communication is essential for the success of any project.

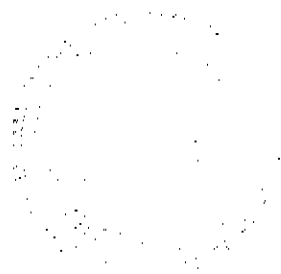
5. Finally, the document concludes by stating that a strong foundation is key to long-term success.

HEALTH HAZARDS OF FOOD ADDITIVES

FOOD ADDITIVE INFORMATION No. 23
(Resolution WHA23.50)

31 July 1973

ORIGINAL: ENGLISH

The Canadian Department of National Health and Welfare has informed the World Health Organization that manufacturers have been advised to discontinue the use of Benzyl Violet 4B in food products.

"Benzyl Violet 4B, currently listed as a synthetic food colour in Division 6 and 16 of the Food and Drug Regulations, has been the subject of an extensive review by officers of the Health Protection Branch. In view of recent reports indicating potential adverse effects in experimental animals and the limited use of this colour in foods, it has been concluded that it would be in the best interests of the consumer to remove this substance, effective August 1, 1973, from the list of food colours."
